

Maine Masonic College Course Proposal Guide

This proposal guide has two purposes:

- a. To provide a tool that will assist those planning and presenting a course.
- b. To provide the College's course approval committee with the data they need for their decision.

Please feel free to attach additional material which you feel will be helpful.

<u>Title</u> Titles are important. Catchy titles may stimulate interest in the course; however, the title should clearly describe the major nature of the course.

Level of Course

General Awareness: A survey level of experience intended to introduce and increase a general awareness over a broad area. Example: Religion and Freemasonry.

Skill Building: A specific, hands-on experience intended to build specific skills in the practice of Freemasonry. Examples: Sharing Masonic Vision in Your Lodge; Planning Your Year in the East.

Fundamentals: A focused study on particular aspects of Freemasonry intended to lay foundations for more advanced study. Examples: The Foundational Symbolism of the Three Degrees; The Fundamentals of Masonic Law.

Extensive Study: An exploration which involves study in depth of aspects of Freemasonry including the intellectual, ethical and social issues of the human experience. Examples: The Philosophic Conversation and Freemasonry's Voice; The Enlightenment and the Modern Craft.

Other: Those courses which do not fit into the above categories.

Type of Course

Lecture: A course primarily conducted through the presentation of a leader but giving opportunity for questions and limited discussion.

Seminar: A learning experience which by design stimulates and maintains dialogue between participants and the seminar leader. Such an opportunity involves preparation such as reading on the part of the participants.

Correspondence: A programmed series of lessons in which responses are sent to an instructor for response and monitoring.

Reading/Response: An educational experience in which the participant reads assigned material and then writes a paper in response which is reviewed by those offering the course.

Practicum: A programmed experience over a period of time in which the participant combines study and actual application and practice in the field. Example: the use of leadership and management skills in developing a youth program within the physical jurisdiction of the participant's lodge.
